

Theresa Benjamin was born in Cleveland, Ohio. She graduated from high school and attended the Art Institute of Pittsburgh for two years before she enlisted in the United States Air Force in 1982.



She was stationed at Elemndorf AFB in Anchorage, Alaska and trained to be a protective coating specialist. She traveled with civil engineering teams that worked on Shemya, Galena, and King Salmon Air Force Bases. Her next duty station was Andrews AFB in Maryland where she was assigned to the base civil engineering squadron and had the opportunity to cross-train into communications as a Tech Controller. Her next duty station took her overseas to Pruem Air Station, Germany, in the Tech Control Facility for base communications support. She returned to the USA for her final duty station at Tinker AFB, Oklahoma where she was assigned to The 3rd Herd Mobility Communications Squadron. In 1990, with an Honorable Discharge, SSGT Benjamin joined the corporate telecommunications industry and set out on her new career path. Beginning with MCI as a inside/outside technician and advancing to a manager position responsible for telecommunication switches, analog, digital and fiber optic equipment and services. Transitioning back into the federal government she was hired by the Federal Aviation Administration as a communications specialist. She now works as a senior communication specialist in the Technical Support Operation Organization. She enjoys photography and traveling in her spare time.

Stanley Fulgham was born on May 8, 1954 in Houston, Texas, attended schools in Duncanville, TX and graduated high school in 1972. He then worked in the Duncanville area before enlisting in the Air Force and started Basic Training at Lackland AFB in January 1977. Afterwards he was stationed at Keesler AFB in Biloxi, Mississippi where he was trained to be an Air Traffic Controller.



Jimmie Von Gonten was born in San Angelo on September 25, 1946, graduated from the San Angelo State College with an Accounting degree, and was immediately drafted into the army at the age of 23.



He was then stationed at Sheppard AFB in Wichita Falls, TX with the 2054 Communications Squadron, Radar Approach Control controlling both civilian and military aircraft. One of his most challenging events was the devastation of a tornado that killed 45 people and injured many more. Air Traffic Controllers were tasked with keeping a huge influx of air traffic safe including many civilian "lookie lu's" who wanted to fly over the area and see the devastation up close and personal. The day of the tornado just happened to be the same day he had his first date with his future wife, Carol. They are still going strong after 43 years. Stanley served for 4 years and then separated from military service at the rank of Sergeant. He went to work for The Federal Aviation Administration in August of 1981 at the Air Route Traffic Control Center (ARTCC) located in Fort Worth, Texas. After a few years he transferred to the Flight Service Branch and worked at the Childress and the Fort Worth Flight Service Stations. In 1988 he took on a new job of maintaining the Flight Service Station main frame computer. This experience provided the transition to the FAA's Airways Facilities Division where he helped maintain the Air Route Traffic Control Center computer in 2005. After 32 ½ years of combined federal service with the U.S. Air Force and the FAA, Stanley retired, at the same time as his wife Carol, on January 1, 2010. Since then, he and Carol have kept busy enjoying their three grandkids and puppy dogs.

He spent months in training at Ft. Polk for Infantry Basic and Advanced Individual training, Ft. Benning for OCS, Ft. Knox for Armor Officer training, Ft. Wolters and Ft. Rucker for Flight training and finally Ft. Stewart for AH-IG, Cobra Helicopter Training. On November 1971, he was assigned to the 60th Aviation Company at Ninh Hoa, Vietnam. Upon completing a one-year tour in Vietnam, he was assigned to Ft Polk, LA for 3 years. Then he was again assigned to Ft Knox, KY for 3 years to work attack helicopter unit manuals and to command a tank training company. After that, he was assigned to Korea as the Logistics Officer, S-4, for a cavalry squadron. One year later, he was again assigned to Ft Knox to work on aviation unit training manuals. His next duty was the Comptroller in Panama School of the Americas. This responsibility was later moved to Ft. Benning, Georgia. Once again, he was assigned to Ft Knox where he was the Comptroller of ROTC Region Headquarters. His last post was at the Pentagon where he worked for DOD on the Panama Canal Treaty Implementation. After 22 years, Jimmie retired as a Lt. Colonel. He lost his wife several years ago but continues to enjoy his 3 daughters and one son, 7 grandkids, and I great-grandchild.

Retreat Round-up

Well, this is the last installment of Retreat Round Up. I'm hoping you've enjoyed learning more about local retreat spots and will try some of them out for yourself.

This month, I'm highlighting the last retreat spot I enjoyed, in mid-October. I love a good shop hop or quilt-centric travel opportunity. Quite a few years ago, I made the pilgrimage to Quilt Mecca....Hamilton, MO, home of Missouri Star Quilt Company. It was terrific. Along the travels, my friends and I hit quite a few shops between here and there. One of our favorite stops was Prairie Quilts in Hennessey, OK. It was a 2 story abundance of fabric, machines, notions and sales! We loved it, talk about it often and looked forward to more visits.

We signed up for their newsletter and were notified frequently of retreats that they conduct. I took advantage of their most recent retreat in Mid-October.

What they say: Bring all your unfinished projects and sew to your heart's content for three days! Thursday 9 AM – midnight; Friday 7 AM – midnight; Saturday 7 AM - 6 PM Cost of our three-day retreat: \$199.00 Retreat cost includes door prizes, 3 lunches, 2 dinners, snacks & drinks. Plus, complete a fun make & take!

What I say: First of all, there is no lodging at this location, so include that in your overall cost calculations. They have a sweet deal with a local hotel, the Sleep Inn, for only \$70 per night, you and a friend...\$35 per night! The hotel is an excellent choice and I enjoyed all the amenities there! As for the retreat location, it is rustic and charming. We were greeted with a spacious room, a lovely goodie bag with a fat quarter, coupon for the owner's other business, Honey & Co, some candy and a pouch we later personalized! The space is one large room with an adjacent dining area and kitchen. There are two bathrooms, more than enough for our group. It is in downtown Hennessey, right next door to the shop and has a wonderful small town feel. The center provides sewing chairs, that you can purchase and take home, plenty of room for your sewing needs, helpers to get you settled and offers quilting expertise you might need. The rustic brick walls are beautiful, but not conducive to 'design walls', but there are padded walls in the dining room for designing. The store allows you to shop, run a tab and if you spend enough, there is a total discount added! The meals were delicious and home cooked, lunch and dinner. Breakfast is on your own...options nearby or at the hotel.

There are at least 4 retreats set up for 2023, check out their website for information and sign up details.

Well, December is the time for presents, so my present to all of you is an EXTRA Retreat Round Up! I don't know how I missed the wonderful, beautiful, friendly Red Boot Retreat!!

I first visited this relatively new location for a New Year's celebration retreat! It was great fun, featuring a cool photo wall with sunglasses, mustaches and 2020 signs. I think!? I'll see if I can add a picture for clarification!


Anyway, Red Boot joined the retreat locations just a few years ago, then I think we shut down with the pandemic, but luckily they survived and seem to be thriving now. We've held our 'second' guild retreats there in the fall for the last 2 years!

What They Say: Red Boot Retreat is located in a quiet country setting on a dead end road. We have a 7600 sq ft building designed specifically for crafters. The retreat features 12 bedrooms and 8 bathrooms with a capacity to sleep 32. The large common area has LED lighting, design walls, comfortable rolling chairs, plenty of table space with surge protectors and electrical outlets. There are home cooked meals provided and an on-site quilt store with last minutes' necessities as well as ample fabric for the quilter that needs more options!

What I Say: Red Boot is a wonderful retreat center with a friendly owner in a lovely rural setting. I vary between staying in place or taking time to 'get away' while on retreat. The quilt store at Red Boot met and exceeded my needs and I'm happy to say I've been to the local shop in Whitney and enjoyed the nice getaway shopping there as well. The rooms at Red Boot are excellent and the food is delicious as well. Carrie does most of the cooking herself with help from her staff. She is generous with her time and talents demonstrating special techniques or hosting specific skills retreats too. I really enjoy retreating at Red Boot and hope to be able to join some groups more in the coming year. The New Year's Retreat was really special too!

Retreats are all inclusive, meals, lodging and all the fun you can manage. Pricing varies depending on any special events, but the norm is \$270 or less for a 3 night, 4-day retreat.



Bear Creek Quilt Guild Board Zoom Meeting Minutes

November 1, 2022

President, Kathi Runyan opened the meeting at 6:33 pm on ZOOM with the following officers and members present: Kathi Runyan, Kay Thomas, Kathy Longo, Aleta Mayrose, Pam Roark, Vicky Kidd, Mary Nalley, Jo-Anne Sheppard, and Angela Hoss. Kathi welcomed everyone to the meeting. October Board minutes were reviewed and motion to accept was made by Aleta Mayrose with a second by Kay Thomas, and the motion passed.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> Kathi reported for Kyle, for the month of October expenses of \$7884.77 (fall retreat, speaker fees), deposits of \$242.33, with a net total of -\$7642.44. Proposed budget for 2023 to be reviewed and voted on at the November General meeting.

<u>Unfinished Business:</u> Kay reported that final numbers from the Quilt Show are still pending. Next week, November 10th, is the final wrap up and distribution of checks.

New Business:

November meeting: At the November meeting, we will be conducting the Quilts of Valor presentations and a New Member Welcome. Doors will open at 6 pm for the New Member Welcome. We should expect approximately 15 new members. Refreshments will be provided. Officers and Committee Chairs should be in attendance to welcome new members and discuss their responsibilities. If not involved in the new member welcome, please try not to arrive at the meeting prior to 6:30pm. Please be sure to wear your name badges. The guild will purchase food items and beverages. We will also have pin cushions for the new members.

Retreat discussion: Board had discussion about having one versus two retreats per year. Considering the difficulty in getting enough attendees for this past fall's retreat, it was suggested the guild consider hosting only one retreat per year. There are no policies regarding the number of retreats. It was recommended that a review be conducted after the April 2023 retreat to determine interest and possibility of having a 2nd retreat. Kathi had sent copies of the Retreat Roundup articles to each of the locations she wrote about and heard back from most of them thanking her for the publicity.

Bookmarks: Kathi suggested we have bookmarks printed with next year's speakers listed. List was received from Aleta, and Kathi will design a mock-up so we can get these printed and distributed by the end of the year (individually and through quilt shops). Aleta made a motion for \$250.00 to be awarded for the printing of the bookmarks, seconded by Kay, and the motion passed.

Open discussion: Aleta suggested we make an honorary gift to a member's charity sewing group. This member has helped in providing a location for some of our guild workshops this year, for which we are grateful. After some discussion, Aleta made a motion to gift this member's charity, Sew Many Blessings Inc., \$100.00 in the member's name, seconded by Kathy Longo, and the motion passed.

November 15, 2022
