I hope this finds you all enjoying tons of summer activities! One of my favorite summer memories as a youngster was HOMEMADE ICE CREAM! Those words are in all caps because I am yelling them due to the wonderfulness of homemade ice cream. LOL!


In preparation for writing this newsletter story, I decided to look up the history of ice cream. I found several different explanations beginning with the earliest evidence of anything being anywhere close to ice cream. It seems that in China in the Tang period (A.D. 618-907) a form of "yoghurt" was produced using buffalo, cows', and goats' milk. Over a thousand years later, Marco Polo returned to Italy from East Asia with a recipe that closely resembled what we now call sherbet. Another resource reported that "Cream Ice" was discovered in the 16th century and regularly graced the table of Charles the 1st. Ice cream became available to the general public around 1660 in Paris. The first official account of ice cream in the New World comes from a letter written in 1744 by a guest of the Maryland Governor William Bladen. The first advertisement for ice cream in the United States appeared in the New York Gazette on May 12,1777. A store merchant's records show that George Washington spent approximately \$200 for ice cream during the summer of 1790. Dude liked his ice cream!

When I was growing up, we had a great, big, wooden ice cream freezer. My parents dragged out the freezer and made homemade ice cream about 6 or 7 times every summer. Of course, we had all the summer holidays to celebrate, plus miscellaneous times when it was just absolutely appropriate to have homemade ice cream. I enjoyed sitting on the towel covered freezer as the handle turned helping the ice and salt produce the wonderful mixture. Homemade ice cream was always a party, in and of itself. (Continued)

Easy Vanilla Ice Cream

This easy ice cream recipe requires no cooking and no eggs. Half-and-half and cream team up with sugar to create a simple, old-fashioned vanilla ice cream that tastes great.

Prep Time: 5 mins

Additional Time: 4 hrs 20 mins Total Time: 4 hrs 25 mins

Servings: 32 Yield: 1 gallon

Ingredients

- 2 quarts half-and-half
- 1 ½ cups white sugar
- ½ pint heavy cream
- 4 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 pinch salt

Directions

Step 1

Combine half-and-half, sugar, cream, vanilla, and salt in the freezer container of an ice cream maker. Freeze according to the manufacturer's instructions, about 20 minutes. Transfer to an airtight container and freeze until firm, about 4 hours.

Cook's Note

This recipe is designed for an old-fashioned ice cream maker that yields one gallon; scale the recipe down if you have a countertop model.

Member In-Person Meeting Minutes

Vicky Kidd called the meeting to order at 7:02 PM. Attendees were greeted and those with June birthdays were recognized and thanked for bringing the evening snacks.

Attendees were encouraged to vote for their favorite mini quilt at the meeting outset and throughout the meeting until time to tally the votes.

A motion to approve the minutes of the May meeting was made by JoAnne Sheppard and seconded by Nancy Carr. The motion carried.

The Treasurer's report was presented by Vicky Kidd due to the treasurer's absence. Reported income of \$271.62 with expenses of \$400.00 resulted in a loss of \$128.38.

There weren't any new members or guests in attendance. Attendees were encouraged to continue striving for perfect attendance to remain eligible for the year-end prize. There are still a good number of eligible members as of the June meeting.

Members are asked to keep turning in volunteer hours to Deb Heid. That includes hours making boutique items or mini quilts, as well as the hours normally turned in for our usual donations. We are also to report those volunteer hours spent on ANY charitable work that are not reported to other agencies. For example, if one donates hours at the local food bank and those hours are not reported to any other 501(c)(3) organization, they are reportable here. Please send Deb your hours by email or the sign-in sheet.

Attendees were urged to sign up to work at the quilt Expo using Sign Up Genius. The link was sent via eblast.

Kayleen Allen presented new items that had been donated recently for sale in the boutique and called for more donations ahead of the upcoming show. If you have donated items to the boutique, you may be eligible to win a \$25 Visa gift card. Four gift cards were donated to have a drawing from the people who donated to the boutique. Kayleen is compiling a list of donors to this year's boutique. Those who were not present at the June meeting but who have donated items are urged to reach out to Kayleen to be added to the list. We plan to have the drawing at the August general meeting.

Vicky reminded those assembled that Tom DeMoss is giving a 25% discount to BCQG members who turn in their items to be longarm quilted during June and July. Please take advantage of his wonderful offer.

It was announced that member Yvonne Highlander fell and broke her leg. She is home from rehab, and surely would appreciate a card or call. Kay Thomas' absence was explained by a trip to the emergency room and those in attendance were encouraged to reach out to Kay with get well wishes.

Doris Schjelderup was the winner of the special quilt kit drawing.

The votes for Mini Quilt entrants were tallied. The first place winner of a \$75 gift card was Colleen Connor, the second place winner of a \$50 gift card was JoAnne Sheppard, and the third place winner of a \$25 gift card was Marie Mote.

Betty Reisch emceed the show and tell presentations, please see the pictures in the newsletter.

Vicky Kidd and Nancy Carr performed the door prize drawings. Additional door prize item donations were requested to be brought to the August meeting.

Nancy Carr introduced the evening's speaker, Beverly Douglas, who gave a presentation on getting your quilt ready for showing followed by a question and answer session that included additional tips offered by those attendees who have previously shown quilts.



Quilt Expo Volunteer Request

I normally try to write a quick article about subscription boxes, but this month I'm going to make a pitch for your help. The Expo is fast approaching and one of my 'extra' hats is the Volunteer Coordinator for the entire Expo. I know many of you are already committed to helping our Guild either with the Boutique or you might have signed up to volunteer through the Expo as an Ambassador. Thanks!!

Later this month I will publish a Sign up Genius volunteer request for many other positions the Guilds need some help with. AND, a few of these jobs cost you NOTHING!! That's right, if you volunteer before the actual Expo starts, there is no parking charge! So, before the Expo we first need help taking in all the quilts that the members will be dropping off on Sunday afternoon, July 28. On Tuesday, July 30 the real work starts. There will be much organization unfolding and quilts will be fluffed, lifted and hung for the show. The call for volunteers will include lots of workers to unload the guilts in their designated display spot, removing it from its pillowcase and then hanging it with care. With many hands, this is almost only a half day's bit of work. And again, no parking charges! Once everything is in place and ready for review, on Wednesday, we'll need scribes to walk with the judges and fill out the forms that will accompany each entry. It's a great experience, I've done it twice myself and always learn something new. The hardest part is staying quiet!! You are there to write down everything (mostly) the judges comments while viewing the quilts under their watch. Depending on which shift you sign up for, you'll be one of the first to know which quilts have been awarded prizes...but mum's the word until Thursday when the show opens! Still no cost to park, it just doesn't get any better!

So, Thursday, the show opens and we have lots of opportunities for our members to help. We sell T-Shirts, take in packages, run the mini quilt auction and help the Show Ambassadors with entry assistance. If standing for long periods is not your thing, there are jobs that require you to sit and help! The bad news, this is when you'll have to start paying for parking. If you sign up with a friend or partner, you can carpool and share the cost!

At the conclusion of the show, on Saturday, there is a frenzy of activity to take down the quilts and get them into the hands of their owners. It's a pretty quick process, very efficient and rewarding all the way around. Most likely you'll work in a team of three to take down the quilts and then they will collate the quilts so that runners will be able to bring them to the check out staff for return to their owners.

Please consider signing up as a Guild Volunteer, we need everyone's help to make this show a success. If you sign up as a Show Ambassador and work a 4 hour shift, you are rewarded with free admission to the show.




